The Status of Children in
Head Start Programs

2007



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I. Introduction

The Office of Head Start (OHS) is pleased to submit this report pursuant to Section 650 of the Head Start Act, as amended. This Section requires the Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) to submit a report to the Congress on the status of children in Head Start programs at least once during every two-year period. This report includes information for Fiscal Year (FY) 2007.

The fundamental philosophy guiding the Head Start program is that children benefit from quality early childhood experiences and that effective intervention can be accomplished through high quality, comprehensive services for children. Head Start supports families, as well, by providing direct and referral services when needed. Head Start and Early Head Start programs foster community involvement in the programs, especially in securing health and social services for enrolled children and their families. During FY 2007, Head Start programs recruited and enrolled children from almost 26,000 homeless families. By the end of the program year, the programs and families worked with community resources to acquire housing for approximately 12,500 of these families.

During the FY 2007 program year, 167,600 children acquired an ongoing source of continuing dental care, and 59,300 children who previously were uninsured acquired health insurance while enrolled in the program.

Intended primarily for preschoolers from low-income families, Head Start promotes school readiness by enhancing the social and cognitive development of children through the provision of educational, health, nutritional, social, and other services. Head Start programs emphasize cognitive, language, and socio-emotional development to enable each child to develop and function at his or her highest potential. Head Start sets goals, measures, and program outcomes for children in emerging literacy, numeracy and language skills, cognitive skills, gross and fine motor skills, attitudes towards learning, social behavior, and emotional well-being.

Head Start focuses primarily on children whose families have incomes at or below the poverty line (in 2007 set at an annual income of \$22,050 for a family of four), or who are eligible for public assistance.

Grants to conduct Head Start and Early Head Start programs are awarded to local public and private for-profit and non-profit agencies by the Administration for Children and Families (ACF). A total of 1,604 grantees in FY 2007 enrolled 1,071,734 Head Start and Early Head Start children in more than 2,200 urban, suburban, and rural communities in all 50 States, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. Territories. These included 155 American Indian-Alaska Native Head Start programs and 26 programs serving migrant and seasonal worker families.

During FY 2007, OHS continued to take important steps to improve the quality of Head Start programs to assure that every enrolled child and family enjoyed the benefits of high quality Head Start services, such as monitoring compliance with Head Start Program Performance Standards. Over 1,100 on-site monitoring visits were made, some in follow-up to identified problems in earlier reviews. This Biennial Report summarizes the results of FY 2007 monitoring reviews.

In the last few years and continuing through FY 2007, Head Start also made a commitment to work with local child care agencies to help meet growing needs of low-income families for quality child care. Head Start programs employ 58,000 parents of former or current Head Start children and report that more Head Start families are employed or moving into welfare-to-work initiatives. Head Start works with local child care providers to find ways to deliver seamless full-day services to low-income families who are working or in job training. More than 101,000 families of enrolled children received child care subsidies during FY 2007 and States contributed to the costs of enrolling 19,800 additional children in the program. Head Start enrolled almost 176,000 children in programs of eight hours a day or more in duration. To help increase the number of children in full-day, full-year programs, Head Start programs combined funding with child care funding sources to operate wrap-around child care programs to provide extended-day services to Head Start children.

Head Start plays an important role as a national laboratory for early childhood development programs. During FY 2007, OHS continued a major research initiative measuring Head Start program quality and children's outcomes across the nation. Launched in 1997, the Head Start Family and Child Experiences Survey (FACES) study follows 3,200 children and families in 40 Head Start programs, and is designed for periodic longitudinal data collection. A fuller discussion of FACES can be found later in this report.

And, finally, during FY 2007, OHS launched its Internet-based Early Childhood Learning and Knowledge Center. This website offers a broad array of information for parents, Head Start staff, and the general public. Experts provide "webinars" designed to help parents and staff on the following topics: working with children to develop early math and science skills, working with dual language learners, child assessment strategies, and methods for working with children from birth to three.

Since Head Start's inception in 1965, Head Start programs have enrolled 25 million children.

*II. Response to Section 650
of the Head Start Act*

This section of the report responds in sequence to specific information requests in Section 650 of the Head Start Act, as amended.

(1) A statement for the most recently concluded fiscal year specifying—

(A) The amount of funds received by Head Start and Early Head Start agencies designated under section 641 to provide Head Start services in a period before such fiscal year;

In FY 2007, Head Start's actual expenditures totaled \$6,887,896,188. Of this amount, \$6,654,316,023 was awarded directly to agencies designated to provide Head Start services in local communities.

(B) The amount of funds received by Head Start and Early Head Start agencies newly designated under section 641 to provide such services in such fiscal year;

In FY 2007, no Head Start program funds were awarded to agencies to provide services in previously unserved communities.

(2) A description of the distribution of Head Start services relative to the distribution of children who are eligible to participate in Head Start programs, including geographic distribution within States, and information on the number of children served under this subsection, disaggregated by type of eligibility criterion;

Appendix A lists, for each county in the United States, the number of children enrolled in Head Start in FY 2007.

(3) A statement identifying how funds *made available under section 640(a)* were distributed and used at national, regional and local levels;

Funds allocated under Section 640(a)(2) totaled \$379,066,818 in FY 2007 and were used for the following purposes:

- ◆ Section 640(a)(2)(A), Funding for American Indian-Alaska Native programs (\$188,210,173); funding for Migrant and Seasonal programs (\$287,675,464). The funds were allocated directly to those Head Start grantees responsible for serving children living on federally recognized reservations, and children of migrant farm workers. In FY 2007, these funds were used to provide Head Start services to 59,013 children;
- ◆ Section 640(a)(2)(B), Payments to Guam (\$2,172,537), American Samoa (\$2,159,044), the Federated States of Micronesia (\$0), the Republic of the Marshall Islands (\$0), Palau (\$1,338,959), the Northern Mariana Islands (\$1,671,096); and the U.S. Virgin Islands (\$8,029,929). The funds were allocated directly to those Head Start grantees responsible for serving children living in these areas. In FY 2007, these funds were used to provide Head Start services to 3,843 children;
- ◆ Section 640(a)(2)(C), Training and Technical Assistance (Total: \$175,197,405). Of these funds, \$70,386,000 was awarded directly to Head Start grantees to allow grantees to purchase their own training and technical assistance (T/TA)

services. The distribution of T/TA allocations by HHS region and Head Start program type is shown below.

Funds not awarded directly to grantees (\$104,828,000) were used to support a variety of T/TA efforts, such as funding Regional Training and Technical Assistance contracts, funding Interagency Agreements with the Public Health Service and the Department of Education, developing and printing training materials, training special populations, and conducting other efforts designed to improve grantee performance.

As authorized under Section 640(a)(2)(D) for research, demonstration, and evaluation projects and Section 640(a)(2)(E) for program support activities, additional discretionary payments totaled \$58,383,000 as shown below:

- ◆ Additional data on Head Start funds allocated under Section 640(a) are detailed in Appendix B.

(4) A statement specifying the amount of funds provided by the State, and by local sources, to carry out Head Start programs;

Head Start grantees are required to generate, from non-federal sources, 20 percent of their total Head Start grant (or 25 percent of their federal funding). Grantees rely on many funding sources to generate this match, including State and local governments. The total non-federal funds reported by grantees for FY 2007 was \$1,663,574,750.

(5) Cost per child and how such cost varies by region;

The national average cost per child in FY 2007 was \$7,326. The variation in cost per child across HHS regions and Head Start program type is attributed to a number of factors, such as the type of program model offered, staffing patterns, the availability of non-federal support and differences based on the cost-of-living. Funds are allocated to the States in an equitable fashion as required by the statutory formula. Appendix C shows the Head Start average cost per child by State.

(6) A description of the level and nature of participation of parents in Head Start programs as volunteers and in other capacities;

- ◆ During the 2007 program year, the total number of volunteers was 1,320,050. Of these, 893,639 volunteers were current or former Head Start parents. The majority of volunteer activities included assisting in the classroom, which accounted for about 70 percent of parent volunteer activity. Parents also served on policy councils, conducted fundraising, helped with recruitment, and participated in a number of other activities.

- ◆ During the 2007 program year, approximately 58,000 current or former Head Start parents worked as paid Head Start staff. Head Start employed 227,488 staff members.
- ◆ More than 237,000 Head Start fathers participated in organized, regularly scheduled activities designed to encourage their involvement in Head Start and Early Head Start programs.

(7) Information concerning Head Start staff, including salaries, education, training, experience, and staff turnover;

Staff Education, Training and Experience, and Turnover

The Head Start Act was amended in 2007 to require that, by September 30, 2013, at least 50 percent of all Head Start teachers nationwide possess a Bachelor's or advanced degree in Early Childhood Education. In 2007, there was a total of 56,425 classroom teachers.

- ◆ In 2007, 33 percent of all classroom teachers held an Associate Degree, 35 percent had a Baccalaureate Degree, 6 percent had a graduate degree, and 19 percent had a State certificate or Child Development Associate (CDA) credential. Additionally, nearly half of all teachers with a CDA credential were enrolled in degree programs.
- ◆ During the 2007 program year (between September 2007 and August 2008), 12 percent of 227,488 total staff left the program and were replaced.

Receipt of benefits under the TANF Program

- ◆ Sixteen percent (154,379) of Head Start families in FY 2007 received Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits under Title IV-A of the Social Security Act.

Disabilities

- ◆ During the 2007 program year, Head Start programs reported that children with disabilities represented 12 percent (127,933) of the total national enrollment.

Foster Care

- ◆ During the 2007 program year, programs reported that children in foster care represented 1.6 percent (17,374) of the total national enrollment.

(9) The use and source of funds to extend Head Start services to operate full-day and year-round;

Approximately 470,140 Head Start families who needed full-day, year-round child care during the 2007 program year made one or more of the following arrangements. (Note that some families appear in more than one group.)

- ◆ A total of 273,060 families received full-day, full-year services directly from Head Start.
- ◆ A total of 27,733 families received additional services at a family child care home.
- ◆ A total of 65,924 families received additional services through publicly subsidized or fee-for-service child care.
- ◆ A total of 175,514 families received additional care from related or unrelated adults at home.
- ◆ A total of 12,641 received care from a public school pre-Kindergarten program.
- ◆ A total of 2,878 families made other child care arrangements.

(10) Using data from the monitoring conducted under section 641A(c):

(A) A description of the extent to which programs funded under this subchapter comply with performance standards and regulations in effect under this subchapter;

OHS conducted a total of 1,107 program monitoring reviews of 469 unique Head Start grantees from October 1, 2006, through September 30, 2007.

Reviews conducted by OHS consist of four types: *First-Year*, *Triennial*, *Other*, and *Follow-up*. First-Year reviews are reviews conducted on grantees after one year of

operation, while Triennial reviews are conducted once every three years throughout a grantee's life cycle. First-Year and Triennial reviews are therefore routine monitoring reviews conducted at planned and scheduled periods. Other reviews are non-routine in nature, and typically are triggered by a potential operational issue or concern in response to which OHS conducted an out-of-cycle review. Grantees found to be noncompliant or deficient in Triennial, First-Year, or Other reviews underwent Follow-up reviews. OHS also began utilizing a *Desk* review in FY 2007, which enabled OHS to follow up on certain grantees that had findings in their Triennial or First-Year review without having to deploy an on-site review team.

The 1,107 total reviews conducted in FY 2007 included the following by review type:

- ◆ 466 Triennial reviews
- ◆ 3 First-Year reviews
- ◆ 8 Other reviews
- ◆ 630 Follow-up reviews, including:
 - ✓ 552 Follow-up reviews conducted by an on-site review team
 - ✓ 78 Desk reviews conducted without an on-site review team.

Of the 552 Follow-up reviews conducted on-site in FY 2007, 129 reviews were conducted for grantees whose Triennial or First-Year review also occurred during FY 2007.

At the end of the monitoring process, a Head Start Review Report was issued to each grantee to indicate the grantee's status in terms of its compliance with Head Start program requirements. The grantee's status is a function of the final determinations made by OHS on each of the preliminary findings documented by the review team during the on-site review. Each finding documented by a review team during a review, and subsequently validated by OHS, may be one of two types: noncompliant or deficient. If the Head Start Review Report issued to the grantee contained one or more noncompliant findings, but no deficient findings, the grantee was determined to be noncompliant.

Overall Compliance Status of Grantees Following a Review in FY 2007

Approximately one in five grantees that underwent a Triennial or First-Year review in FY 2007 was found to be compliant with Head Start requirements (21.8% or 102). Most grantees that underwent a Triennial or First-Year review in FY 2007 were found to be noncompliant (71.1% or 332) with at least one area of noncompliance (ANC) cited in a review report. Fewer than 10 percent of grantees reviewed were found to be deficient in a Triennial or First-Year review in FY 2007 (7.1% or 33).

There were a total of 1,914 findings reported on 467 Triennial and First-Year reviews in FY 2007, 93.1 percent (1,781) of which were areas of noncompliance, while 6.9 percent (133) were deficiencies. The majority of grantees (78.2% or 365) reviewed in FY 2007 had at least one finding. More than two-thirds of all grantees that underwent a Triennial or First-Year review in FY 2007 had 0 to 4 findings (68.1% or 318). Of grantees that had findings on their Triennial or First-Year review, nearly one-third had 1 to 2 findings and approximately 10 percent had more than 10 findings.

Nearly one-fifth of deficient grantees (18.2% or 6) had one deficiency; nearly one-third of deficient grantees had two or fewer deficiencies (30.3% or 10). Two of the 33 deficient grantees (6.1%) had more than 10 deficiencies.

Most Commonly Cited Noncompliances and Deficiencies for Triennial and First-Year Reviews in FY 2007

Exhibit 1 presents the performance standards for which grantees were cited most frequently on noncompliant findings in Triennial and First-Year reviews. Review teams cited performance standard 1310.21(a) (training on pedestrian safety) during reviews of 13.3 percent of grantees with at least one noncompliant finding (48 of 362 grantees) in FY 2007, followed by performance standards 1304.51(i)(2) (ongoing monitoring), 1304.53(a)(7) (maintenance, repair, and safety), and 1305.3(c)(3) (serving children with disabilities). Of the 10 performance standards for which grantees with at least one noncompliant finding were cited most frequently, five were in the Program Design and Management area of the Head Start Monitoring Protocol; two were in the Education and Early Childhood Development Services area; two were in the Safe Environments area; and one was in the Health Services area.

Exhibit 2 presents the performance standards for which grantees were cited most frequently on deficient findings. Review teams cited performance standard 1304.24(a)(2) (mental health services) during reviews of 27.3 percent of grantees with at least one deficient finding (9 of 33 grantees) in FY 2007, followed by performance standards 1304.24(a)(3)(i) (design and implement program practices), 1304.51(i)(2) (ongoing monitoring), and 92.20(b)(3) (internal control). Of the 10 performance standards for which grantees with at least one deficient finding were cited most frequently during Triennial and First-Year reviews in FY 2007, three performance standards, including the top two, were from the Mental Health Services Area; six were in the Program Design and Management area; and one was in the Health Services area.

Outcomes of Follow-Up Reviews for Grantees Found Deficient and Noncompliant in FY 2007

Of the 33 grantees found deficient in Triennial and First-Year reviews in FY 2007, 30 grantees (90.9%) had been cited for both deficiencies and noncompliances, while three grantees (9.1%) had been cited only for deficiencies.

Of the 166 noncompliant grantees that had a completed Follow-up review by March 1, 2008, 165 grantees had *all* noncompliances reviewed during the Follow-up (99.4%), while one grantee did not have all non-compliances reviewed (0.6%).

Of the 165 noncompliant grantees that had all non-compliances reviewed at Follow-up:

- ◆ 151 corrected all noncompliances and became compliant (91.5%)
- ◆ 3 corrected the noncompliances cited during the original review, but each were cited for a new noncompliance and, therefore, remained noncompliant (1.8%)
- ◆ 11 corrected some noncompliances, but had uncorrected non-compliances elevated to deficiencies, and therefore became deficient (6.7%)

(10)(B) A description of the types and conditions of facilities in which program are located;

Head Start classrooms usually are located in public schools and public housing or other government owned spaces. Churches, synagogues, community centers and grantee-owned spaces also are likely to house Head Start classrooms. Typically, Head Start programs rent classroom space, however, facilities also may be made available to grantees for no cost or at below market rates. Head Start assists grantees in properly maintaining facilities by making funds available to make repairs and renovations when necessary. Since 1994, the Secretary has had the authority to make funds available for the renovation or construction of facilities when alternative suitable facilities are not otherwise available in a grantee's service area.

(10)(C) The types of organizations that receive Head Start funds under such programs;

(11) The information contained in the documents entitled "Program Information Report" and "Head Start Cost Analysis System" (or any document similar to either), prepared with respect to Head Start programs;

The information contained in the Program Information Report (PIR) and the Head Start Cost Analysis system is used to respond to the requested information throughout this report.

National level summary data from the PIR forms for 2007 is included as Appendix D. Head Start's Grant Application and Budget Instrument (GABI), which replaced Head Start's Cost Analysis System, is included as Appendix E. This Office of Management and Budget (OMB) approved document can be filed electronically by grantees and is designed both to streamline the grant application process and to provide cost information efficiently, which was gathered previously by the Head Start Cost Analysis System. The Head Start Fact Sheet is included as Appendix F. The *Federal Register* Notice of the Biennial Report to be published once the Report is submitted to Congress is included as Appendix G.

(12) A description of the types of services provided to children and their families, both on-site and through referrals, including health, mental health, dental care, parenting education, physical fitness, and literacy training;

All percentages for this section are based on the reported total actual Head Start and Early Head Start enrollment for FY 2007, which was 1,071,734, unless otherwise indicated.

Medical Services

- ◆ During the 2007 program year, medical screenings, including all tests and physical examinations, were completed for 89.3 percent of children (957,058).
- ◆ Of those children who received medical screening, 16 percent (171,477 children) were found to be in need of medical treatment; 94 percent of these children

(161,188) received treatment by the end of the program year. Children were referred most often for treatment for hearing and vision problems, over and under-weight conditions, asthma, and anemia.

- ◆ During the 2007 program year, 96.5 percent (1,034,223 children) were enrolled in Head Start for at least 45 days and either had completed, or were current with, required immunizations.

Dental Services

- ◆ During the 2007 program year, dental examinations were completed for 88 percent of the children (943,126) enrolled in Head Start.
- ◆ Of those children who had dental exams, 24 percent (226,350 children) required dental treatment.

Parenting Education

- ◆ About 45 percent of parents who had children enrolled in Head Start received parenting education services. This service was provided to almost 445,000 of the 977,942 families.
- ◆ Slightly more than 43 percent (423,985 families) received health education services, including prenatal education.
- ◆ Slightly more than 14 percent (140,124 families) attended adult education services.

Social Services

- ◆ Head Start enrolled 29,623 children from 25,969 homeless families (2.7 percent of the total number of families). Of these families, almost 48 percent (12,443 families) acquired housing during the year.
- ◆ Head Start families that were determined to be in need of social services were referred most often for emergency or crisis assistance, housing assistance, mental health services, adult education, and job training.

Physical Fitness

- ◆ Head Start Performance Standards require sufficient time, space, and materials for active play and movement that supports development of gross motor skills and physical fitness. The standards also require that the program staff periodically assess the development and fitness of the children and make referrals necessary to assure follow-up with health professionals.

(13) A summary of information concerning the research, demonstration, and evaluation activities conducted under Section 649 including: (A) a status report on ongoing activities; and (B) results, conclusions, and recommendations not included in any previous report, based on completed activities;

It is critical that Head Start continues to invest in research and evaluation activities which build upon the existing research investments and demonstrate responsiveness to the various recommendations contained in the "Blueprint" Panel report, the Advisory Committee on Head Start Quality and Expansion report, the Head Start Act, as amended, the National Academy of Sciences Roundtable on Head Start Research publication, *Beyond the Blueprint: Directions for Research on Head Start's Families*, and based on input from a number of key researchers from the field.

The broad categories of Head Start research and evaluation efforts include the following requirements:

- ◆ Conduct new Head Start research focusing on quality and other policy issues;
- ◆ Conduct longitudinal research on children and families served in Head Start programs;
- ◆ Conduct intensive evaluation of services for infants and toddlers;
- ◆ Conduct studies of special subpopulations separately or embedded in larger studies; and
- ◆ Develop and enhance capacity for research on Head Start in partnership with the larger child development community.

Individual studies or activities contained within the broad categories are summarized below to respond to (13)(A) and (B):

1. Program Quality and Effectiveness

- ◆ *Head Start Family and Child Experiences Survey (FACES)*: FACES has collected longitudinal data on nationally representative samples of children and families in Head Start programs at three-year intervals since 1997. FACES provides descriptions of the characteristics, experiences, and outcomes for children and families in Head Start, with follow-up data collection in the spring of kindergarten and first grade. A fourth cohort of FACES was launched in 2006. A contract for a fifth cohort was under review for award in 2008, with data collection to begin in 2009. Findings from FACES are supporting new program initiatives in teacher education, staff development, and family literacy. - ◆ *Head Start Impact Study*: The Head Start Amendments of 1998 (P.L. 105-285) directed the Secretary of HHS to conduct a study to provide a national analysis of

the impact of Head Start. A contract for the study was awarded in September 2000. A report on the first-year findings was released in June 2005. The study has two goals: (1) to study, on a national basis, the impact of Head Start on children's school readiness, as compared to children not in Head Start, and (2) to determine under which conditions Head Start works best and for whom. Starting in the fall of 2002, children were assigned randomly to Head Start or a non-Head Start comparison group, and were to be assessed in the fall and spring of the Head Start year, as well as at the end of kindergarten, first grade, and third grade. Data collection and analyses were ongoing in 2007. More information is available at: http://www.acf.hhs.gov/programs/opre/hs/impact_study/index.html

- ◆ *Early Head Start Research and Evaluation Project:* In order to evaluate the Early Head Start program, serving children from birth to age three and pregnant women, this project is studying approximately 3,000 families living in 17 diverse communities across the U.S. The project has four central purposes:
 1. Continuous program improvement;
 2. Rigorous cross-site impact study;
 3. Understanding the role of program and contextual variations; and
 4. Creating a foundation for longitudinal research studies.

A follow-up was completed in which children and families were contacted again in the spring before kindergarten entry. Another follow-up, which is focused on the spring before children's entry into the fifth grade, is in the data collection phase. Data collection was expected to continue through 2008 and 2009.

- ◆ *Survey of Early Head Start Programs:* The survey of all Early Head Start programs is the first step in a planned series of ongoing descriptive studies of Early Head Start. The survey focuses on management systems and services provided, as well as on the characteristics of families served, and will: (1) provide key information designed to help policymakers and training and technical assistance providers; (2) serve as a baseline for future descriptive studies that

chart changes in programs and families over time; and (3) provide information for constructing a sample frame for the next phase of Early Head Start research.

A 2007 contract was awarded for a second effort, which will provide nationally representative descriptive information similar to what is provided in the FACES studies.

- ◆ *Head Start CARES (Classroom-based Approaches and Resources for Emotion and Social skill promotion)*: This project will develop and implement an evaluation of three different social-emotional program enhancements or practices within Head Start settings. The project will involve identifying evidence-based practices and programs related to children's social emotional development; developing and implementing a plan to work with the developers of these programs and practices to implement them in multiple Head Start settings; developing and implementing a plan to evaluate rigorously the programs or practices utilizing group-randomized trial techniques; and exploring what factors within settings are necessary to implement the program options of interest effectively within Head Start classrooms. Recruitment of programs and classrooms for the study was scheduled for 2008 to 2009.
- ◆ *Head Start/University Partnerships & Graduate Student Head Start Research Grants*: This discretionary funding supports research conducted by faculty members or graduate students in university settings who form partnerships with Head Start or Early Head Start programs for the purposes of contributing new knowledge about the development of young low-income children or improving services for these children and their families. Topics have included:
 1. Developing and testing models for use of child outcomes to improve local program effectiveness;
 2. Supporting mental health of infants, toddlers, and their families in Early Head Start;
 3. Developing measures;
 4. Developing new curricula;
 5. Field-initiated research conducted by graduate students and their faculty mentors under the Graduate Student Research Grant program; and
 6. Studies of teacher characteristics and practices that promote classroom quality.

A set of grants focusing on English Language Learners was awarded in 2007.

- ◆ *Research Center for American Indian/Alaska Native Head Start:* A five-year grant was awarded in 2005 for the purpose of developing capacity for early childhood research in American Indian and Alaska Native communities. The grantee is conducting pilot research studies and providing technical assistance and training to promote research in tribal settings.
- ◆ *Design for Studies of Migrant and Seasonal Head Start:* A contract was awarded in 2007 for exploring design options for evaluating Migrant and Seasonal Head Start programs. Extensive consultation with key stakeholders was conducted in the initial phases of the contract. Recommendations and options will be presented related to issues of sampling, measurement, and implementation of studies in highly variable settings with highly mobile populations.

2. Interagency Partnerships

- ◆ *The Interagency School Readiness Consortium (ISRC):* ISRC supports eight five-year research grants studying the effectiveness of early childhood interventions and programs for children from birth through age five in promoting children's school readiness. The projects are studying a range of interventions including integrated preschool curricula, Internet-based teacher training, and the importance of parental involvement for improving children's readiness to enter school. The interventions are being implemented and studied in public early childhood settings across the country including Head Start, child care, and State Pre-K programs. The ISRC is a collaborative effort of ACF, the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD), the HHS Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation (ASPE), and the Department of Education. The ISRC grants began their final year in 2007.
- ◆ *National Survey of Agricultural Workers:* The NAWS, under the direction of the Department of Labor, collects quarterly data on a nationally, representative sample of migrant farm workers. In 2007, ACF continued to support an addition to the ongoing NAWS that will provide information on child care and Head Start utilization in this population.

(14) A study of the delivery of Head Start programs to Indian children living on and near Indian reservations, to children of Alaskan Natives, and to children of migrant and seasonal families;

Services to Children Enrolled in American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) Head Start Programs:

Over \$188 million was allocated to 155 grantees providing Head Start services to 23,096 American Indian and Alaska Native children and their families. A majority of the grants (147) were awarded to Tribal governments or consortiums. Program designs include full and part-day, full and part-year, center-based, home-based, and combination options. The majority of the children (23,021) enrolled in AIAN Head Start programs had health insurance. Over 15,000 enrolled children received health care through the Indian Health Service. More than 6,000 children who received dental screening as part of their Head Start enrollment were identified as needing treatment. Of these children, 4,200 received the necessary treatment. Approximately 13 percent of enrolled children were diagnosed with disabilities and 93 percent of these children received special education and related services.

Services to Children Enrolled in Migrant and Seasonal Head Start Programs:

Almost \$288 million was allocated to 26 grantee agencies to fund enrollment of 35,917 children of migrant and seasonal farm workers. Migrant and Seasonal Head Start programs enroll children from birth to age five. Almost all of the children actually enrolled (33,000) received at least six hours per day of service and the majority (28,200) spent at least eight hours per day in Head Start. Some grantees provided services six days per week to accommodate the needs of parents doing farm work. Approximately 25,100 children had health insurance at the time of their enrollment. Over 7,900 children in Migrant and Seasonal Head Start programs had no health insurance at the time of enrollment. An additional 3,000 children obtained health insurance while they were enrolled in Head Start. Over 4,300 children were identified as needing medical treatment at the time of their Head Start physicals and most received care through Migrant Community Health Centers. Of the 5,000 children diagnosed as needing dental treatment, 3,400 received treatment while enrolled in Head Start.

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Appendix E

**Head Start Grant Application
and Budget Instrument**

I. General Instructions

A. Introduction

The Administration for Children and Families (ACF) will make annual grant awards for 12-month periods to Head Start and Early Head Start grantees on a three-year grant application cycle. Applicants must submit a full project description, a budget, and a budget narrative in the first year of each three-year grant cycle. Applicants shall submit an **abbreviated project description, a budget and budget narrative in each of the subsequent two years**. Separate budgets must be completed for Early Head Start grants and Head Start grants even if funds are to be awarded in a single grant document.

B. Due Dates for the Submission of Applications

Applications should be submitted to ACF no later than 90 days prior to the end of the grant period. An original application and two copies should be submitted to the responsible ACF Grants Officer.

C. Content of Applications

Applicants must submit the following seven items in continuation applications for each year of the grant cycle. The Project Description and the Budget and Budget Justification must be submitted in full in the first year and the Project Description may be abbreviated in subsequent years, in accordance with the attached instructions in Part II, below.

Computer-generated facsimiles may be substituted for any of the forms in this packet. To facilitate review and processing of the application, all pages should be numbered.

1. Standard Form (SF) 424: Application for Federal Assistance

A copy of this form is attached.

Regarding the box in the upper right corner, "Applicant Identifier," insert the applicant's grant number.

Regarding Item 9, insert "Administration for Children and Families/DHHS."

Regarding Item 10, the Federal Domestic Assistance Number for the Head Start and Early Head Start Programs is 93.600.

Regarding Item 11, in addition to the title of the project, applicants should specify whether the submission is for a first-, second-, or third-year continuation or an application for supplemental funds or a request for a grant amendment.

Regarding Item 16, this program is covered under Executive Order 12372, Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs, and 45 CFR Part 100, Intergovernmental Review of Department of Health and Human Services Programs and Activities. Applicants in States and jurisdictions participating in the Executive Order process should contact their State Single Points of Contact (SPOC) as soon as possible to alert them to the prospective application and to receive any necessary instructions.

2. SF 424A, Budget Information — Non-Construction Programs

The SF 424A must be submitted for all funding requests.

In programs where there are delegate agencies, a separate must should be submitted for each delegate agency and a combined form should be submitted for the grantee with the total costs associated with delegate agencies included in the Contractual Object Class Category, Section B., line 6f.

In Section B, Budget Categories, applicants should enter proposed budget amounts for Training and Technical Assistance funds in a column separate from the column for funds for program operations.

Federal program costs should be placed in the Object Class Categories in Section B, in accordance with Part III, Instructions for the *Program Approach Form* and the Line-item Budget.

In Section C, Non-Federal Resources, applicants should enter the amount of non-Federal Resources, including cash and in-kind contributions that will be used to support the project.

Section D, Forecasted Cash Needs, and Section E, Budget Estimates of Federal Funds Needed for Balance of the Project, should be left blank.

Explanations and justifications of the amounts proposed in the SF 424A must be provided in Section A.3 of the Project Description, Budget and Budget Narrative Statement.

3. Program Approach Form and Line Item Budget Form for Head Start and Early Head Start

These forms are provided to help standardize the presentation of this information and to provide ease in presenting it. Applicants must complete these forms in accordance with Part III., Instructions for the *Program Approach Form* and Line-Item Budget for Head Start and Early Head Start.

In programs where there are delegate agencies, a separate Program Approach form must be submitted for the grantee and for each delegate agency. A separate form must be submitted for Early Head Start and Head Start.

Applicants also must fill out the Program Approach and Line-Item Budget Forms for Head Start and Early Head Start as part of their grant applications. Separate forms must be submitted for Early Head Start and Head Start. Where programs are delegate, separate *Program Approach Forms* and Line Item Budget Forms must be completed for each delegate agency.

4. Project Description and Budget Justification

Applicants must submit a Project Description based upon Part II, Instructions for Completion of a Full and Abbreviated Project Description, Budget and Budget Justification for all Head Start or Early Head Start Grant Applications.

5. Policy Council Approval

Applicants must attach documentation of Policy Council approval of the application.

6. Indirect Cost Negotiated Agreement

Applicants must submit a copy of the most recent indirect cost agreement, if applicable, negotiated between the grantee or delegate agencies and the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Cost Allocation, or other cognizant Federal agency.

7. Certifications, Disclosures, and Assurances

Applicants must sign and submit the attached *Compendium of Required Certifications and Assurances*, which includes: SF 424B Assurances — Non-Construction Programs; Drug-Free Workplace Requirements — Grantees Other than Individuals; Certification Regarding Environmental Tobacco Smoke; Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, and Other Responsibility Matters; Certification Regarding Lobbying, Certification For Contracts, Grants, Loans, and Cooperative Agreements; and Certification of Head Start Administrative Costs. The compendium must be signed by a designated official of the governing body of the grantee agency.

II. General Instructions for Completion of a Full and Abbreviated Project Description, Budget and Budget Justification

All applicants must submit a Project Description, Budget, and Budget Justification based upon the following instructions:

Section A: All continuing applications. Applicants submitting applications for the first year of a three-year cycle should respond to the "Full Project Description" instructions, Applicants submitting applications for the second and third year of a three-year cycle should respond to the "Abbreviated Project Description" instructions.

Section B: Applicants requesting supplemental funds.

Section C: Applicants requesting grant amendments.

Project Descriptions should be concise and complete, but not unnecessarily lengthy.

A. Continuation Application

1. Objectives, Need for Assistance, and Geographic Area

Full Project Description

Objectives and Need for Assistance: Applicants must submit a summary of significant findings from the most recent Community Assessment. Included should be a summary of each of the six categories of information required by the Head Start regulation on Eligibility, Recruitment, Selection, Enrollment and Attendance in Head Start, 45 CFR 1305.3(b):

- The demographic make-up of Head Start eligible children, including number, location, and ethnic and racial composition.
- Other child development programs serving Head Start eligible children.
- The estimated number of children with disabilities.
- Data regarding the education, health, nutrition and social service needs of Head Start eligible children.
- The education, health, nutrition and social services needs of Head Start eligible children, as defined by their families and community institutions.
- Resources available in the community.

Applicants should explain how the findings of the Community Assessment were used to help reach decisions in the six areas listed in 45 CFR 1305.3(c):

- Determine the program's philosophy and long-range and short-range program objective.
- Determine the type of services and program option or options to be provided.
- Determine the recruitment area of the program.

- If applicable, determine the recruitment areas of delegate agencies.
- Determine the locations of centers and home-based programs.
- Set the criteria that define the types of children and families that will be given priority for recruitment and selection.

Geographic Area: Applicants must identify their proposed service area and define it by county or sub-county areas, such as a municipality, town or census tract, neighborhoods or streets, or a Federally recognized Indian reservation. Maps or other graphic aids may be attached.

Abbreviated Project Description

Objectives, Need for Assistance and Geographic Area: Applicants must provide a summary of any significant changes in the information in the Community Assessment determined during the annual review of the Community Assessment including changes in the service area. The applicant must describe any proposed changes in the program that have resulted from a reconsideration of the decisions described in the six areas listed in 45 CFR 1305.3(c).

If there are no major changes, this should be stated in the application. No additional information is necessary.

2. Program Approach and Results or Benefits Expected

Full Project Description

Program Approach: Applicants must provide information regarding both their program's long-range goals and the objectives to be accomplished during the three-year period. Goals and objectives must relate to the findings of the Community Assessment, be consistent with the philosophy of Head Start, and reflect the findings of the program's annual self-assessment.

Applicants must fill out the *Program Approach Form*, explained below in Section II, which specifies the kinds of Head Start services which will be provided.

Applicants must describe how they are going to deliver high quality services to children and families in all areas of service and program management defined by the Head Start Program Performance Standards (45 CFR Part 1304) and the Head Start Program Performance Standards on Services to Children with Disabilities (45 CFR Part 1308). Applicants must discuss how they plan to provide Early Childhood Development and Health Services, build Family and Community Partnerships and ensure effective Program Design and Management. Applicants must explain how their approach is linked to findings of the Community Assessment and the program's long-term and short-term goals. Full written plans for implementing services should not be submitted.

Applicants must provide information on progress made in meeting program requirements and plans for improving the management and delivery of services. Specific needs for improvement identified through self-assessments, monitoring reports, cost analysis data, Program Information Report data, audits, fiscal reports and correspondence from the Regional Office should be discussed.

Results or Benefit Expected: Applicants must provide a brief summary of the results and benefits which are expected in meeting the goals and objectives of the program during the following three-year period.

Abbreviated Project Description

Program Approach: Applicants must provide information regarding changes to the local long-range goals and shorter-term program objectives to be accomplished during the three-year cycle. If there are no changes to the program goals and objectives, this should be stated in the application. No additional information is required.

If major changes from the previous year's program are proposed, applicants must submit information to explain and justify the proposed changes. Major changes are the addition or discontinuance of a program option, addition or discontinuance of a delegate agency, reductions in total funded enrollment, and changes in the structure of Head Start/Early Head Start coordinating/management staff positions.

If no major changes are being proposed, this should be stated in the application. No additional information is required.

Results or Benefit Expected: Applicants must provide a summary of results and benefits which have been realized in meeting the goals and objectives of their program in implementing major activities established for the previous program year.

3. Budget and Budget Justification

Full Project Description

Applicants should complete the Line-Item Budget for Head Start and Early Head Start which provides detail for each object class on the SF 424A. Applicants also must provide a narrative budget justification which that explains the necessity, reasonableness, and allocability of proposed costs. The budget justification should relate the proposed budget to the activities indicated in the Program Narrative.

Applicants must provide itemized lists of equipment purchases and contracts and a brief explanation of travel costs and of non-Federal resources used to meet the non-Federal match requirement. The budget narrative discussion should make reference to these lists, and should provide narrative discussion of any items that merit further explanation.

Applicants also should explain and justify any proposed renovations or construction, and any "other" direct costs (in object class (h) of the Line-Item Budget). The budget narrative should explain any situation or special programming that makes the data on the *Program Approach Form* and Line-Item Budget unusual.

Information must be provided regarding the source and amount of cash and other resources that will be used to support the project in addition to the Federal funds requested and the required non-Federal match. In instances where the Head Start program delivers services in cooperation with other child development and child care programs, such as State-funded preschool or child care, applicants should describe how coordination will be managed from a budgetary perspective, addressing such areas as shared staff, facilities, and equipment.

Abbreviated Project Description

Applicants must submit the Line-Item Budget for Head Start and Early Head Start and a budget justification annually.

B. Application for Supplemental Funds

For supplemental assistance requests, applicants must explain the reason for the request and justify the need for additional funding. Applicants must indicate whether the request is for a permanent funding increase or if the request is for one-time funds. An SF 424 and 424A form, including evidence of Policy Council approval of the request, also must be submitted. Certification Regarding Environmental Tobacco Smoke

Public Law 103-227, also known as the Pro-Children Act of 1994 (Act), requires that smoking not be permitted in any portion of any indoor facility owned or leased or contracted for by an entity and used routinely or regularly for the provision of health, day care, early childhood development services, education or library services to children under the age of 18, if the services are funded by Federal program either directly or through State or local governments, by Federal grant, contract, loan, or loan guarantee. During Fiscal Year 2007:

- Approximately 12 percent of the Head Start enrollment consisted of children with disabilities (i.e., mental retardation, health impairments, visual handicaps, hearing impairments, emotional disturbance, speech and language impairments, orthopedic handicaps and learning disabilities).
- Over 47,000 children participated in home-based Head Start program services.
- 74 percent of Head Start teachers have at least an Associate degree in Early Childhood Education.
- More than 25 percent of Head Start program staff members were parents of current or former Head Start children. Over 893,000 former or current parents volunteered in their local Head Start program.
- 93 percent of Head Start children had health insurance. Of those with health insurance, 87 percent were enrolled in the Medicaid/Early Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT) program or a State sponsored child health insurance program.
- The 1994 reauthorization of the Head Start Act established the Early Head Start program for low-income families with infants and toddlers. In Fiscal Year 2007, approximately \$689 million was used to support more than 700 programs which provided Early Head Start child development and family support services in all 50 States and in the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. These programs served over 100,000 children between birth and age three.
- More than 237,000 Head Start fathers participated in organized regularly scheduled activities designed to involve them in Head Start and Early Head Start programs.
- 96 Head Start and Early Head Start Programs were sponsored by faith-based organizations.

The Head Start and Early Head Start programs are authorized under the Head Start Act (42 U.S.C. 9801 et. seq.). Head Start is a national program providing comprehensive developmental services to low-income preschool children, primarily age three to age of compulsory school attendance, and their families. To help enrolled

children achieve their full potential, Head Start programs provide comprehensive health, nutritional, educational, social and other services. Section 650 of the Head Start Act requires that the Secretary publish a Biennial Report of the Status of Children in Head Start Programs. The Fiscal Year 2007 Biennial Report provides information about children enrolled in the program and the services they receive. During Fiscal Year 2007, approximately 1,072,000 children were enrolled in Head Start programs. Head Start operated 49,400 classrooms in 18,275 Head Start centers at an average annual cost per child of \$7,326. Approximately 1,320,000 volunteers contributed their services to Head Start programs.
