What is it? International Mother Language Day, sponsored by the United Nations, honors the diversity of languages that exist globally and emphasizes the importance of maintaining a multilingual society.

Why celebrate? A society that celebrates and supports mother/heritage/home languages nurtures cultural identity and benefits from the rich diversity of its members.

How can children participate?

- ◆ Have children help create banners and posters commemorating the day.
- ◆ Help children create a graph of the languages spoken in their classroom or home-based group.
- ◆ Teach children to say “hello” in all the languages in their classroom or home-based group.
- ◆ Teach children a simple song in each of the languages spoken in your classroom or home-based group.
- ◆ Sing or play recorded songs and lullabies to babies and toddlers in the different language spoken in your program.
- ◆ Ask children to share stories, songs, and rhymes in their mother/heritage/home language (including English) and record them for the children to take home.
- ◆ Read or tell stories to teach words or simple phrases in the different languages spoken in the classroom, such as animal names.
- ◆ Make up or adapt children’s games using words from different languages, such as playing Pato, Pato, Ganso instead of Duck, Duck, Goose.
