

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
Why This Topic?

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1302.101 (b) Coordinated approaches

At the beginning of each program year, and on an ongoing basis throughout the year, a program must design and implement program-wide coordinated approaches that ensure:

1. ... **training and professional development**...
2. ... full and effective participation of children who are **dual language learners**...
3. ... full and effective participation of all **children with disabilities**...
4. ... management of **program data**...

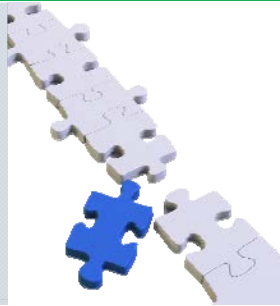

Subpart J – Program Management and Quality Improvement

1302.100 Purpose.

A program must provide management and a process of ongoing monitoring and continuous improvement for achieving program goals that ensures child safety and the delivery of effective, high quality program services.

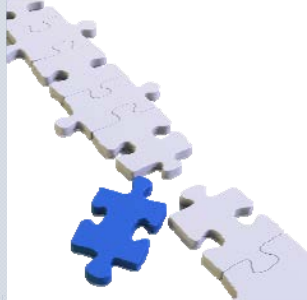

1302.101 (b) Coordinated approaches that ensure:



1302.101 (b)(3) The full and effective participation of all children with disabilities, including but not limited to children eligible for services under IDEA, by providing services with appropriate facilities, program materials, curriculum, instruction, staffing, supervision, and partnerships, at a minimum, consistent with section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act;
