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Basics of the Home-Based Program Option



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The Head Start Home-Based Program Option




An Early Head Start home-based program must provide one home visit per week per family that lasts at least 1.5 hours and provide a minimum of 46 visits per year.

A Head Start home-based program must provide one home visit per week per family that lasts at least 1.5 hours and provide a minimum of 32 visits per year.

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 The Head Start Home-Based Program Option



What do you do when:


- A family cancels a home visit or scheduled socialization activities


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 The Head Start Home-Based Program Option

Home visits must be:

- conducted with the child's parent.
- may not be conducted with only babysitters or other temporary caregivers in attendance.



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Using the Framework

The *Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework: Ages Birth to Five* describes the skills, behaviors, and knowledge programs must foster in all children.
